Q.—We would like to set a post with concrete for our new mail box. How do you go about setting a new post?

Doug and Kate

A.—Generally, the concrete post hole should be 1/3 to 1/2 the height of the post. If your post is 6 feet high, then you should position the post in a 2' - 3' hole. Dig a hole 3' deep and wide enough for the post to slip into the hole easily. You will need two 50 lb bags of fast setting concrete to set a mailbox post in a hole that is 1/3 - 1/2the height of the post. Place the concrete tub form in the hole and set the post into the form and make sure the post is standing up straight. Next, pour the concrete mix into the tube. Keeping the post straight in the hole, pour water into the dry mix and allow it to soak in. Use enough water to saturate the dry mix. Fill the remainder of the hole with the soil you dug earlier from the hole. The concrete will set in 20-40 minutes. Wait four hours before placing heavy objects on the post.



- 1. Heat grill to medium. Once hot, clean and oil grill grates. Stir together mayo, sour cream, garlic, lime juice and chili powder in a bowl. Season with salt and pepper.
